SEPTEMBER 29 -OCTOBER 2 BY ANNE RUSSELL

The 2022 Midwest Region fall meet was held on September 29 through October 2 based in Hagerstown, MD. A total of 55 people attended, 12 Franklin cars, and one Dodge truck.

On **Thursday**, our first day of touring, was a guided tour of the **Antietam Battlefield** followed by lunch in Sharpsburg, MD explaining the fascinating history of the battle where over 20,000 people lost their lives or were injured in one day.

For the afternoon several activity choices were available with the majority of people visiting the **Crystal Grotto Caverns** followed by either wine tasting at **Big Cork Vineyards** or a tour of **Rob Burchill's restoration shop.**

On **Friday** we toured **Fort Frederick**, a fortification active in the French and Indian War and the American Revolutionary War, located in Big Pool, MD with a guided tour and musket demonstration. We then toured to the **Hagerstown Aviation Museum** where the Experimental Aviation Association (EAA) provided lunch, a guided tour of the facilities and airplanes in the collection. We had the opportunity to get pictures of the cars with the airplanes in a very large hanger. One of the guides was dressed in period attire as Rosie the Riveter. We next gathered at the **Russell's home** for a view of their car collection and garages. Dinner was provided by a local barbecue who provided a trailer on site. Finally, **Brian Caron** gave a talk on the history of high wheel bicycles as well as a riding demonstration.

On **Saturday**, despite the rainy remnants of hurricane lan, we toured to the **Conococheague Institute** located in Mercersburg, PA. This 30-acre site is dedicated to displaying colonial life in the 18th century. Here we learned about all of the facets of living off the land in these times. A boxed lunch was provided on site. After this several people drove to the nearby **Mercersburg Academy** for a drive through view tour of the beautiful campus. For the afternoon there were two choices to attend. The first was a discussion held at the host hotel by tea expert **Paulella Burchill** author of the books "Tea for Every Occasion: A Book of Wonderful Ideas for the Tea Lover" and "Antwon's Tea". She provided three different teas to sample along with finger foods. After the tea, we had a Zoom painting lesson with Les Tryon, where she guided us through watercolor paintings of samples and then notecards. Also, at this time a **tech session** was held at the Russell's home where **Bouvard** discussed concentric valves and a hands-on attempt to get a Series 9 brougham running.

Sunday was another rainy day however most of our activities were held indoors. An hour-long morning **yoga** class was offered with instructor **Beth Hanna**. We then toured the **collection of Don Bowman**, a local business man and owner of Bowman's Trucking. Here we viewed his many antique and modern automobiles as well as a collection of large antique trucks. Our next stop was the **Washington County Rural Heritage Museum** to see Dagmar cars, made in Hagerstown, as well as several other unique vehicles, bicycles, and farm implements. Our banquet was held in the evening at the **Elmwood Bed & Breakfast** in a lovely recently renovated barn. A region business meeting was conducted by Roger Moffat.

A TRUE CONFESSION—FRANKLIN STYLE

My name is Tom, and I am an autoholic. It probably hasn't been long enough since my purchase of yet another car...

Truth be told this disease started many years ago, and in it's earliest stages was – perhaps unwittingly, perhaps not – helped along by people whom presumably loved me.

The first three movies I can ever remember seeing as a child, were Chitty Chitty Bang Bang (originally written as a children's story by no less than Ian Fleming of James Bond fame), The Gnomobile and The Love Bug. The blame for the last two films can be laid squarely at the feet of Disney Studios. These films were (O.K., are) the groundwork for the automobile sensitivities that rule my thought processes to this day. These are - 1: Old Cars are far better and much more interesting that new cars. 2: Old cars will always be capable of things new cars are not. 3: The most popular makes of car are hardly ever the most interesting.

Much later in high school for example, I had zero interest in Camaros, Firebirds, Mustangs or Dodge Chargers, and instead became enamored with MGs, Triumphs and Austin-Healeys – despite living in a small town where no such cars existed, and where even fewer places to service them existed, should you be fool-hardy enough to actually buy one. Being someone who accepts fool-hardiness as a sort of badge of honor, I bought a Triumph TR4-A as my first car, which meant I rapidly became a self-taught mechanic and body-man. I became a fairly good amateur mechanic. 45+ years later I am still waiting to become a fairly good body-man.

Flash forward a few decades and by now I have had one of just about everything – at least in my price range. From Corvair Monzas to Model T and Model A Fords, one or two old Mercedes, various and sundry MGs and Triumphs, a Packard 200, 1950's Buicks, BMW 2002s and Bavarias, a Morris Minor saloon with right-hand-drive – and even a Rolls-Royce Silver Shadow – but I had yet to own anything approaching a CCCA Full-Classic – until my dentist and fellow MG nut friend of mine, Dr. John Bloom suggested I have a look at Franklins (his enthusiasm is helped along by the fact that his in-laws live in Tucson, AZ. – very close to the late Tom Hubbard's Franklin Museum.

Now, since I have been a car nut since about the ripe old age of four, I knew what a Franklin was – but I was sure I'd never seen one in person, just in one or two of the hundreds of car books which by now were part of my personal collection. My initial research intrigued me even more – air-cooled engine technology, a respectable race history, limited build numbers and an eventually unhealthy devotion to quality even in hard financial times just made Franklins even more appealing to me. Dr. Bloom also suggested that he knew of a Franklin several miles from his home in Libertyville, IL that had been advertised but, he believed, was still available – even though by now I was combing all the on-line and in-print classifieds for Franklins, and doing what additional research I could on my own. Most other Franklins I considered were many miles away, and even if restorable, would require an expensive shipping bill to get home. I settled on the Libertyville car, being very close to me in Crystal Lake, IL. I was happy she was a 1931 Model 153 sedan after my own research left me wanting a steel-chassis car with enough performance potential to keep up with modern traffic. I was also looking forward to a collector car that wouldn't be as intimidated by giant SUVs as was my diminutive Morris Minor.

In the meantime – sometime in April of this year – I had joined the H.H. Franklin Club, had started bothering several members for information, and had found "my" Franklin in Club records going back to 1968/9 with long ownership by Frank Beck (if anyone remembers him, please let me know). The first newsletter I read mentioned a Midwest gathering in and around Winona MN coming in June. I knew where Winona was as I had been there on business years before, it was within a reasonable drive from my home, and I also had a good friend in Minnesota that I hadn't seen in far too long – so this would be a perfect opportunity to catch up with some old friends, see some Franklins in the flesh, and make some new friends.

While I was there, I met many helpful and friendly Franklin owners, and in particular Tom Rasmussen from Odyssey Restorations who not only let me sit in his '31 153 sedan (I'm 6'4" and wanted to check for leg room), but later that day took me for a ride and even let me have a turn at the wheel. Now convinced that the 153 was the car for me, I immediately went ahead with the purchase of the Libertyville, IL car and got it shipped to my mother's previously empty garage very near my house.
